Orange Corners Senegal starts 3rd cohort with 60% female entrepreneurs

Haskè Ventures, the new implementing partner of Orange Corners Senegal, selected 20 Senegalese entrepreneurs for the third cohort, from a pool of 330 applications. Of the selected entrepreneurs, 60% are women. They are active in various sectors, such as agri-processing, media, health and fashion. Supporting female entrepreneurship is in the DNA of Haskè Ventures. They have a track record in supporting female entrepreneurs, but they also keep a close eye on the gender-balance within their own team (60% female). Haskè Ventures is very much looking forward to start the cohort with these amazing entrepreneurs.

First Angolan Conference on the Social Impact of Angel Networks

The first-ever angel investment conference entitled "Angel Investment for Social Good Conference" in Angola



took place at the beginning of June. The aim was to put angel investing on the map in Angola. Important keynote speakers were: Tsjeard Hoekstra, the Dutch ambassador to Angola; Alexandra Fraser, founder of a.o. the African Angel Academy and Zachariah George, managing partner of Launch Africa Ventures. Brainstorm on the future of entrepreneurship education in



DRC

Orange Corners also works in K2K programmes on entrepreneurship education. The Erasmus Centre for Entrepreneurship (ECE) with support of Ingenious City (Orange Corners DRC) organized a training for 24 professors and teachers of seven Congolese higher education institutions. This enables them to develop entrepreneurial training modules for their students. Orange Corners HQ visited ECE to have a brainstorm on the future of entrepreneurship education in DRC.



Changemakers



CoCreateMyCity in Korhogo, Ivory Coast

CoCreateMyCity is a student competition where students co-create entrepreneurial solutions to local challenges. The students are supported by various experts and mentors. Last week a CoCreateMyCity took place in Korhogo, Ivory Coast, with students of UPCG (Université Pelefero Gon Coulibaly). During the CCMC the students learned to work with the principles of Design Thinking, putting the end-user at the heart of the solution, while solving 4 local SDG related challenges. An example of a challenge is 'How might we train illiterate farmers/breeders in sustainable farm management?' For each problem the student groups came up with 8 solutions, the crazy8 exercise! This year, two more CCMC's will be organized in Ivory Coast.

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
